
Lesson Body:

Read Luke 16:1-13

Throughout his three year ministry, Jesus told many parables. The Parable of the Unjust Steward in Luke 16:1-13 teaches us about trust, responsibility, wisdom, and preparation. The steward who was trusted with the great responsibility of managing his master’s wealth, was tempted by greed. He was unjust and stole from his master. Of course, his thievery was discovered and he was fired from his job. He knew well that after losing his job, he would not have an income to live the lavish life he was used to. So, he decided to gain friends who would be helpful to him in the future by lessening their debt. He lost the trust of his master, but gained the trust of the debtors he helped. When the master found out, he praised the steward for being clever and securing his future.

So, what is a steward? Let’s take a moment to think and write about stewardship.

A steward is someone who takes care of things, someone who is trusted with certain responsibilities. Each of us make household contributions that we fulfill one way or another. By doing so you become one of the stewards of your house. Those responsibilities can include taking a good care of our houseplants, pets, keeping our homes tidy, our family, our money: all the beautiful things that God has given us.

He gives us things and trusts us to take care of them. He wants us to be good stewards. The same way your parents give you responsibilities and trust you to do them with care and respect.

In today’s memory verse, we are reminded to be faithful in caring for things big and small. If we are dishonest or we are not good stewards in little things, most likely we will be the same with big things. How we care for small responsibilities says a lot about how we will take care of bigger responsibilities.

The Parable of the Shrewd Manager

Jesus told his disciples: “There was a rich man whose manager was accused of wasting his possessions. So he called him in and asked him, ‘What is this I hear about you? Give an account of your management, because you cannot be manager any longer.’ “The manager said to himself, ‘What shall I do now? My master is taking away my job. I’m not strong enough to dig, and I’m ashamed to beg— I know what I’ll do so that, when I lose my job here, people will welcome me into their houses.’ “So he called in each one of his master’s debtors. He asked the first, ‘How much do you owe my master?’ “‘Nine hundred gallons[a] of olive oil,’ he replied. “The manager told him, ‘Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it four hundred and fifty.’ “Then he asked the second, ‘And how much do you owe?’ “‘A thousand bushels[b] of wheat,’ he replied. “He told him, ‘Take your bill and make it eight hundred.’ “The master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly. For the people of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own kind than are the people of the light. 9 I tell you, use worldly wealth to gain friends for yourselves, so that when it is gone, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings. “Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much. So if you have not been trustworthy in handling worldly wealth, who will trust you with true riches? And if you have not been trustworthy with someone else’s property, who will give you property of your own? “No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money.”
